To promote	Try to
	Start the day with a movement activity like stretching or dancing.
Health	Incorporate brain breaks into lessons to offer opportunities to refocus and re-energize.
	Display visuals that promote healthy habits, like handwashing or nutritional information.
	Provide opportunities for students to drink water throughout the day.
Cofety	Begin each day with a morning meeting to connect with students and build relationships.
Safety	Use positive language and nonverbal cues to communicate respect and care to students.
	Actively listen to students' concerns and perspectives and validate their feelings.
	Discuss conflict resolution skills and model them through role-playing.
	Model respect for diversity and inclusivity in your interactions with students
	and in the curriculum.
	Connect lesson content to students' personal experiences and interests
Engagement	Connect lesson content to students' personal experiences and interests.
	Employ a variety of teaching methods to reach students with different learning styles.
	Incorporate games and interactive activities into lessons to increase engagement. Display student work and celebrate their achievements.
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Support	Greet students individually at the door each morning.
	Use students' names and make eye contact when interacting with them.
	Provide specific and constructive feedback on student work.
	Identify avenues for extra help and support.
	Communicate regularly with families about student progress and any concerns.
Challenge	Offer differentiated assignments so students can challenge themselves.
	Connect learning to real-world applications.
	Encourage students to set goals and track their progress.
	Showcase student learning through presentations, projects, and performances.
	Help students identify and develop their strengths and talents.
